Valerie's Reveries

I was watching a squirrel recently in the 32-degree heat in the middle of the day. He seemed undisturbed by the sizzling air as he went about his work. He had purpose. He was on a mission. He was not to be distracted.

He was knocking down every last sap-dripping pinecone from the spruce tree in my yard. Every. Single. One. Into the grass they fell with their sticky sap messiness. But he wasn't done. Once the squirrel had dropped them, he went around collecting them for his winter cache, ignoring my dog and me.

He put one in his mouth and came to my front porch. He climbed up into the large ceramic flowerpot, ignoring the geraniums, and he deposited the pinecone in the soil.

He went down the porch steps, turned around, stood up and looked where he had just left it. Then he turned his head and looked to the other side of the porch where another pot sat. He studied it for a moment, then climbed back up the steps and pulled out the pinecone he had just buried and took it to the *other* pot, where he buried it and scurried away. I'll never know why he preferred the pot on the left to the pot on the right.

I began wondering, what is our purpose as a church that would have us so determinedly working, so clear in our mission that *nothing* would pull us off track?

I believe Jesus said it well: "I have come that they may have life, and have it abundantly." We grow into this invitation, and along the way we create such an open and inviting and welcoming space that others who come begin to know the same invitation, and together we carry that invitation out into the community beyond until we are simply being moved by the Spirit with such a purpose that it cannot be thwarted, not even by the sticky sap messiness of every last one of us.

Maintenance News

2025 has been quite an active year so far. Projects we have had going to date:

- the whole basement and stairwell repainted
- the basement floor stripped and waxed
- carpets cleaned in narthex, sanctuary, chapel, kitchen, main hallway and boardroom
- two large spruce trees removed because of severe virus damage
- remaining tree stumps ground down
- replaced 3 furnaces in old furnace room
- repaired hot water tank
- sewer line flushed out
- replaced fire-monitoring panel and fire panel due to a lightning strike that hit the cell tower immediately behind the church. This caused a tremendous power surge, damaging these panels, which then required an update in their electrical wiring to meet current codes
- investigated a water leak in the basement kitchen
- currently in the process of redoing landscaping under the church sign facing Riverbend Road, repainting the sign, replacing ballasts, and installing LED lighting

So there is a lot of activity behind the scenes - all part of being proactive with maintenance issues in an older building.

National Day for Truth & Reconciliation/Orange Shirt Day: September 30

Terry Fox is a hero to many Canadians, including myself. Terry's cancer diagnosis put in motion a run that changed the world. He dipped his artificial leg in the Atlantic Ocean in St. John's, Newfoundland on April 12th, 1980, and proceeded to unite Canadians in a way like never before: to run across Canada to raise funds for cancer research. The only thing that could have stopped Terry from reaching the Pacific Ocean did. Cancer returned in his lungs, and he was forced to stop in Thunder Bay, Ontario on September 1st, 1980, after having run 5,373 kilometres.

Before his death on June 28, 1981, Terry had achieved his once unimaginable goal of \$1 from every Canadian. More importantly, he had set in motion the framework for an event, The Terry Fox Run, which would ignite cancer research in Canada, raising more than \$850 million since 1980, and bring hope and health to millions of Canadians.

This year, the Terry Fox Run is scheduled for Sunday, September 14 at Kinsmen Park starting at 11:00 am. For more information on the run, please visit https://terryfox.org

The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation is a day that honours the children who never returned home and the survivors of residential schools, as well as their families, and communities. Public commemoration of the tragic and painful history and ongoing impacts of residential schools is a vital component of the reconciliation process. Both the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day take place on September 30.

Orange Shirt Day is an Indigenous-led, grassroots commemorative day intended to raise awareness of the individual, family, and community inter-generational impacts of residential schools, and to promote the concept of "Every Child Matters". The orange shirt is a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom, and self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations. On September 30, Canadians are encouraged to wear orange to honour the thousands of survivors of residential schools.

I'm sure we all have a bucket list of some sort. Some people write everything down and check it off as they achieve something from the list; for others it is not so much a list as something they have always wanted to do, unsure if it will ever be achieved.

I fall into the latter category. For the last 40 years, I have dreamed of attending the Championship (or Wimbledon as it is perhaps better known). Each year, there is always more demand than tickets, and a public ballot takes place. I have family members and friends who have entered the ballot for 10+ years without any success, and whilst it was a dream of mine, other things always seemed to take priority, and I was content to watch the Championship unfold on my TV screen.

One of my earliest memories was watching the ladies final in 1977 when Virginia Wade was presented the trophy by the Queen, who was celebrating her Silver Jubilee. And I was fortunate to be in Scotland in 2013 when the men's final took place, and will never forget the feeling of watching Andy Murray lift the trophy; a wait of 77 years since Fred Perry's success - the last British man to do so. However, I digress. This year, I entered the ballot and was unsuccessful; however, my sister also entered the ballot, and she was successful! She was offered two tickets to the number one court on July 10^{th} for the men's doubles semi-finals and asked if I would like to go with her. Would I like to go? What a foolish question that was. Within 30 minutes of her email, my flight was booked and I was London-bound.

On a day with a 31 degree forecast, we boarded our train to Wimbledon. As with anything, there is always the worry that the event won't live up to the hype or the picture you've built in your mind, but I needn't have worried. I had a fantastic day! There is a great museum on site telling the tournament's history, along with some amazing memorabilia. The strawberries and cream were delicious (the strawberries are picked in Kent every morning at 4 am and driven to the grounds), and the tennis itself was spectacular. We were treated to two great semifinals, one featuring a British doubles team who eventually won the event, hurrah! and, as a bonus, we also saw one of the wheelchair doubles semifinals. It is truly amazing to watch the speed and agility with which the wheelchairs are maneuvered. Again, it featured a British pair, who had both already competed in the singles event that day (did I mention 31 degrees!), they truly are remarkable athletes. It was a memorable day and exceeded all expectations. Needless to say, my sisters and I are planning to enter the draw again next year!

I wonder if you have had the opportunity to tick something from your bucket list? Did it live up to your expectations? Perhaps you would consider sharing it with us in *The Front Pew*. We love hearing of your adventures.
