Digital Advent Calendar

For the season of Advent this year, the Spiritual Formation Committee has created a digital Advent Calendar. Like a traditional Advent Calendar, the doors are numbered 1 to 24, one for each day from December

1st, until Christmas Eve. Behind the doors you may find a photograph, a piece of scripture, music, or some audio.



To use the calendar,

click in the centre of each numbered door, which will "open" to reveal what's inside. Once you have finished looking at that day's door click on "RUC Advent Calendar," to return to the main page.

Advent Prayer Tree "Take a prayer, leave a prayer"

In the narthex during Advent you will find a Christmas Tree, with paper star decorations hanging on it, some blank and some with prayers written on them, along with some prophet scrolls ... this is our Advent prayer tree. You are invited to look at the prayers hanging on the tree and, if the Spirit moves you, to write your own prayer on one of the decorations, for sharing with this community of faith. If one of the prayers really "speaks" to you, then please feel free to take it home for a week to reflect on and then return it for others to read. You are also welcome to take one of the prophet scroll decorations to put on your own tree at home.

The Christmas Story Trail

Around the church during this Advent season, you will

find five story cards telling the Christmas Story from the Angel appearing to Mary to the Magi presenting their gifts. Each card focuses on one of the characters. Using your phone, scan the QR code and follow the instructions to see their part of the story shown in LEGO animation. At worship on December 28th, the complete LEGO movie will be shown.

Do you and your family enjoy singing Christmas carols? Wendell Berry is a "nature" poet, among other things. This devotional uses his poetry alongside Advent scriptures from our Liturgical Year A that we'll be reading on Sunday mornings.



What is 'contemplation' in the Christian tradition? Contemplative practices bring us out of our head and into our heart, where God's loving presence is always available to us. Building a contemplative dimension in your life is easier in a spiritual community. Starting in January 2026, our church will offer an inaugural Contemplative Practice Series, led by Graham Gaine.

Meeting in the Chapel at 9:30-10:20 a.m. on four consecutive Sundays from January 4 to 25, the group will be introduced to a variety of spiritual practices, including centering prayer, welcoming prayer, prayer of the heart, and lectio divina (sacred reading). Each meeting will include 15 minutes of silent group meditation, introductory instruction on contemplative practices, and sacred sharing. Feel free to join us for any or all meetings (choir members may join from 9:30-10:00 a.m. to participate in silent meditation before choir rehearsal). Looking forward to seeing you there!

Outreach Committee - Winter Outreach Projects

With the support of RUC, the Outreach Committee has been busy supporting the community through The Food Pantry. When donation suggestions for "Spaghetti" items were made, the response was overwhelming. Food items requested for the remainder of the year are items of protein: peanut butter, beans, canned fish/meat, lentils etc.

The annual call for winter clothing has also provided critical warm items for those in need. Three deliveries have been made to The Mustard Seed, where they have been well received. When you continue to get ready for winter any "extra" items you may have can be donated in the box in the Narthex.

This Christmas, on behalf of the congregation, the Outreach Committee will be supporting Operation Friendship. Operation Friendship is a program supporting 55+ seniors in need within Edmonton. They have 5 housing facilities and collect items for seniors with less means. They have requested that monies collected be used to purchase sweatpants/joggers, long underwear and toiletries. Riverbend United Church has been supporting people in need in the inner city through RUC's Christmas project for well over 18 years. It makes a huge difference in people's lives at Christmas.

February will see the return of the now annual "Sock Toss". This appears to be popular among the congregation as folks are already inquiring if it will take place. Although a date has not yet been decided upon, it will return in February so feel free to start purchasing socks for men, women and children. Last year 654 pairs of socks were donated.





It marks the official start of winter; when the South Pole is tilted closest to the sun, creating the day with the shortest period of daylight and longest night of the year. In Edmonton this year, the solstice begins on Sunday, December 21 at 8:03 a.m. when Edmonton will only receive 7 hours, 27 minutes, and 39 seconds of daylight on that day. It is only after this time when the days gain a little more daylight each day, hence the reason this day is dear to me.

Our Church Sign

Do you ever look at the church sign as you drive past? Do you read the messages posted and wonder why they were selected? Do you wonder what goes into changing the sign? Carolyn Miller is our resident sign changer, so we approached her to get the answers.

We asked Carolyn "what is the purpose of the church sign, and are there any challenges to changing it?" This was Carolyn's response:

There are many ways the church sign is used:

- First and foremost, it is an invitation to the wider community to join us in worship and know they will be welcome.
- Secondly, it is a great way to publicize events happening at RUC, such as the Garage Sale, Marvelous Music, Community Christmas Carol Sing and previously the Cookie Walk.
- Thirdly, it can be used for messages of support to the marginalized and during COVID, it was used to encourage folks to get the jab.
- Finally, it recognizes major events in the Liturgical calendar such as Advent, Lent and Easter. And in 2025 was used to welcome the Northen Spirit Region Delegates to our church.

The main challenge to changing the sign is the weather!! In the winter, it can be difficult to change if the temperature drops below about -15 as the letters are very cold (*Carolyn is too!*) and the plastic runners can become brittle, so have to be handled very gently. Also, people should be aware that 5 runners can hold 15-18 letters (I's are narrower than W's), so the message must fit on the sign. Sometimes it needs to be changed slightly based on that, and the fact that there are finite numbers of each letter and number.

So, remember, if you have an event happening at RUC that you want the community to know about, then you can submit a request to the church office for a message to be put on our sign, giving as much notice as possible. Have a look at the photos, showing some of the messages on our sign-the FP team















Did You Know?

Did you know that for many years, RUC held an annual golf tournament where foursome teams competed for the Holgate Cup? The cup was named after our late dear friend Ron Holgate, who was an avid golfer and responsible for organizing the tournament in the early years of its existence.

Held at a local golf course in September, the teams would play in the morning and then return to the church for lunch supplied and served by our United Church Women, which included Ron's wife, LaVon.
